100 Things I Wish I Had Known As A Pilot!

We have all had those times where a piece of information would have been nice to know 5 minutes before!
Well this is just a small list of some of those things!



EVERYTHING AVIATION - SIMPLY EXPLAINED

- 1. Never get in your aircraft without walking around it Cowl Latches always seem to be left open by customers!
- 2. Place the fuel cap on your seat You will never forget to put it back on
- 3. New fuelling locations Test for COWS Color, Odor Water, Sediment
- 4. Always close the passenger doors then get in. They never close doors properly
- 5. Always have black garbage bags to hand. Sick Sacs fill very quickly!
- 6. Post-It notes make great sun visors
- 7. Never put a phone out of the window to take a photo The wind WILL remove it from your hand!
- 8. Keep a window cloth handy for wiping off condensation
- 9. If picking up passengers who are wet Cool the cockpit, it will prevent steaming up the windows
- Have a dry erase marker handy for writing on aircraft windows – Call signs and Frequencies!



- 12. Cheap rubber matting, cut to size makes cleaning the aircraft so much faster!
- Always wipe and wax windows in the direction of wind flow – Helps prevent distracting streaks
- 14. Never use Polarized Sunglasses with Glass Cockpits Lenses can block displayed information
- 15. Buy a Good Pair of sunglasses UV Radiation increases with altitude
- 16. Always have frequencies and runway directions of nearby airports on a pad of paper
- 17. Get Foreflight for your lpad or lphone It will change your life!
- 18. Ensure aircraft steps and footholds have wingwalk painted on them Frost and slips are a bad combination!
- 19. Keep windows cleaned and waxed to help bead away rain Rain always sticks to windows at the worst possible time!
- 20. Listen to your gut It's good at telling you to turn around, land or not takeoff!



22. Remember that darkness happens sooner on cloudy, overcast days!



- 23. Get some instrument, low visibility and night training regularly to keep those skills refined - They could save your life one day!
- 24. Never call your spouse just before takeoff Distracted minds have killed many pilots!
- 25. Never forget to close your flight plan!
- 26. Air Traffic Control is your friend Talk to them early if you start to have an issue
- 27. If you are flying to a new, busy airport Call the tower when flight planning and see if they have any navigation information
- 28. Always have a flight plan and a backup plan!
- 29. Join a flying club Its a great way to keep learning and make new friends!
- 30. Try and buy your own aircraft It might be cheaper than you think!
- 31. If you are not sure, find out before committing!
- 32. Every month re-read the emergency checklist Executing a procedure by memory could save your life!
- 33. Read accident reports to learn from others mistakes
- 34. Go to a Fly-in. They are great fun!
- 35. Pass on your knowledge to others We all have different experiences that others can learn from!
- 36. Always talk clearly on the radio It keeps everyone safe
- 37. Always make blind radio calls you never know who has just fired up or switched to your frequency
- 38. Always do a low pass at new landing sites bumps, rocks and obstructions are easily hidden when flying higher
- 39. Practice Go-Arounds and aborted takeoffs regularly
- 40. Talk to other pilots and find those 'Gems' of a place to visit or fly over





- 41. Always ensure a chart/map is to had and folded to your area Electronics fail!
- 42. If its really cold, tuck your GPS into your coat when parked and waiting They don't like cold!
- 43. Hand and foot 'Hot Pockets' are a welcomed relief if needed Keep one in your aircraft
- 44. Keep a small tool kit in the aircraft
- 45. Have a good watch Accurate timekeeping is paramount!
- 46. Wash and wax the aircraft regularly It will save you time and gas!
- 47. Never rush a Daily Inspection
- 48. Never distract a pilot or engineer working or inspecting an aircraft
- 49. Detailed inspections are a must after anyone has worked on the aircraft Rags and tools left behind are killers!
- 50. If something is not working right Get it looked it



- 52. Always check the correct fuel truck or fuel tank is about to pump into your aircraft!
- 53. If you are a short person, a small pair of lightweight steps are a must when travelling Trust Me! I'm only 5'6"
- 54. Check flashlight batteries work and have spares easy to hand
- 55. Don't worry if a wasp or bee comes into the cockpit. Leave it alone Pilots have crashed trying to swat a wasp!
- 56. Tell nervous passengers what you are doing as you fly Give them a task to do or landmark to look for
- 57. Regularly wipe and clean all flight controls, handles, knobs, buttons and headsets of club or school aircraft
- 58. Always listen You might learn something
- 59. Help new pilots and flight students You were there once



- 60. Learn who are good instructors/companies and send pilots to them if someone is looking
- 61. Never allow shooting videos/taking photos to distract you from flying
- 62. Always Aviate, Navigate, Communicate In that order!
- 63. Go visit an air traffic control tower and radar control center It's a great way to understand the other end of the radio
- 64. When learning to fly, get a radio and sit by a busy training airport and listen to ATC. You will soon begin to understand
- 65. Always keep your books from flight school, you will be surprised how many times you refer to them in the future!
- 66. Buy a good, quality headset It will last you for decades! My Bose Aviation X is 15 years and still going!
- 67. Never be in a rush to fly allow lots of time and be thorough in your pre-flight
- 68. Camelbaks are great to hang on the back of the seat and keep you easily hydrated!
- 69. Never place objects where they can fall and end up by your feet! Jammed rudder pedals are not fun!
- 70. Buy Good quality when you can It will last you longer





- 71. Buy used text books for school Far Cheaper!
- 72. Online Written test prep courses are very, very helpful!
- 73. Keep a digital and paper logbook! Losing your only copy is devastating
- 74. Fill in your logbook after every flight Lots of flying and no updating means a long time filling it in!
- 75. Create a mental checklist of everything you do before take off never deviate from it
- 76. Never assume anything Always confirm!
- 77. Avgas on a shop towel is a good degreaser for cleaning oil off belly of an airplane
- 78. Clean bugs off when you land The longer they sit, the harder it is to get them off
- 79. ANR headset is a must. Don't waste your money on one that doesn't have it.
- 80. Sunglasses with thin rims will keep your headset quieter.



- 81. Use inactive VOR OBS to document wind direction at departure or destination airport
- 82. Don't fly with frost on the plane. EVER!
- 83. Always be looking for where you will land if you lose your engine
- 84. If you have an emergency landing, fly the airplane all the way to the ground. Don't stall the airplane, it will nose dive
- 85. Use carb heat even in warm environments. You can develop carb ice in the middle of the summer!
- 86. On hot days if cylinders are overheating and still needing to climb, carb heat will enrichen the mixture and cool the engine
- 87. View landings as a flight maneuver... don't just let the airplane stall and end up on the ground. Put it where you want it
- 88. Evaluate all instructions ATC gives you before automatically complying... they make mistakes, too! And you are PIC, not them
- 89. Download LiveATC.com app and listen to your local airport to get more proficient on the radio
- 90. When taxiing on soft ground (i.e. mud), don't make sharp turns or full brake on one wheel. Keep your momentum up
- 91. Always give yourself permission to go around on approach and landing. Always!
- 92. On approach, use the mantra "high, low, fast, or slow... and what are you gonna do about it?



- 93. On instrument approaches, narrate your altitudes out loud so you don't blow through your MDA/DA. "500 for 250"
- Fuzzy/intermittent radio could be a sign of your alternator failing. Look for any other instruments switching to internal battery
- 95. If an instrument is giving an emergency indication, cross-check that against other instruments to confirm
- Don't ever be afraid to ask a "dumb" question. If you are thinking it, others have thought it too.
- 97. Visit 'Airfield.Guide' for a great directory of non-paved airstrips
- 98. When flying at night, if city lights start getting halos around them or appearing blurry, you are actually flying into clouds
- 99. Use an isolate button on your comm stack if you have it, for chatty passengers
- 100. Tell your passengers your tail number and tell them to listen for it on the radio. If someone says your tail number, be quiet

and a few more just for you..

- 101. When flying IFR keep your instrument scan going Don't fixate on just one instrument
- 102. Never allow a small problem to distract you and create a big problem
- 103. Alway think about what is the next thing to do in the flight before you get there
- 104. Listen to the stories of the older, wiser pilots. Someone has always done something stupid you can learn from
- 105. Never fly low over a snow covered lake or prairie during an overcast sky You will get whiteout
- 106. Keep a mental note of where the wind is at all times Over left shoulder for example
- 107. If able, avoid approaches towards westerly runways in the late evenings Sunglare is brutal
- 108. Get into the habit of not walking under tailbooms, especially on helicopters Catching an antenna can be expensive
- 109. Use your peripheral vision to look for other aircraft Movement is easier to spot
- 110. Form a mental plan of what the airport looks like as you approach it. Approaching from 90 degrees can look very different
- 111. Always have a good look before entering onto ANY runway. A pilot with their radio accidentally turned down can be fatal
- 112. Keep hydrated Flying on hot, dry days can soon lead to thirst.
- 113. Be sure to make all your passengers go to the bathroom before the flight!
- 114. Always do your daily inspection with just one rag or paper towel and never put it down. Leaving a rag behind has been fatal
- 115. Close your eyes before opening air vents Dust blown into eyes can be deadly
- 116. Always check NOTAMS Landing at an airport that has run out of fuel is stressfull
